"The Beginning of Lent"

"Take up your cross and follow, deny yourself, for whoever wants to save one's life, will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me, will save it." Luke 9: 23-24

A Trappist monk once remembered Ash Wednesday at their Abbey near Huntsville, Alabama. In mid-winter it was usually cold and the monks would walk barefoot in single file from the main building to the chapel to receive the daubing of ashes, a visual reminder of their need for repentance.

The image of people stepping in the footprint of another for warmth on a cold day is apt for the beginning of Lent. The season of Lent begins early this year. The weather is chilly. We're looking for a little WARMTH... and along comes Ash Wednesday. As Christians, we come face to face with our humanity and mortality and understand that ashes are a symbol of both sorrow and a desire for repentance. Having spent a considerable amount of time in New Orleans with many of you from North, I/we can attest to the fact that Ash Wednesday is much more subdued than all the parades and parties that make up Mardi Gras! In fact, Mardi Gras is far more than one day of celebration as it stretches over many weeks in New Orleans. We love a parade and a party. Yet going beyond the mindset of culture and one's own frame of reference, Lent is the season of reflection and repentance. We slow down and move from a place of in-ward self-knowledge, toward a reconnecting of the Spirit's transforming action. Thomas Carlyle once wrote: "Of all the acts of humanity, repentance is the most divine. The greatest of all faults is to be conscious of none." Jesus calls us to reflect and prayerfully consider life and our relationship with one another and God.

Join us on **Ash Wednesday, February 14, at 7:00 p.m.** and we'll stop long enough to have ashes daubed on our foreheads and walk barefoot in the footprint of Jesus and one another into this season of lengthening days called Lent.

Lent is a time of rearranging our time, marking out space and purpose. Like Jesus, we retreat away from one place to another. We intentionally change our routines, with the hope that we might see clearer. Jesus goes apart so he does not come apart.

As well, like our Lord, we often grow closer to God by sacrificing something in our lives that distracts us from this relationship. Even Jesus needed a place where he could focus not on all that he was called to do (healing, miracles, teaching, etc.) but on his intimacy with his Father. Going out into a wilderness refocuses our attention from all that demands our attention. Today, many folks are showing their true spiritual colors by putting down their smart phones and devices during Lent, much like people did for years with food, drink or bad habits that annoy the life out of ourselves and others. The frequency of receiving and sending emails, texts, news, advertising and the avalanche of information that is ever growing; has become our new health crisis. To say people are distracted today, no matter their age, is an understatement.

This Lenten season is a timely reminder of a spiritual practice that is ancient, but ever so needed. Lent parallels the forty-day period Jesus spent in preparation of the ministry to which he would change the world. His sacrifice was immense.


MISSIONS MINISTRY BOARD

Crossroads

Many thanks to everyone who brought in warm clothing, hats, gloves and socks to church this past Christmas season. Your generosity was overwhelming and greatly appreciated. A few members from North, along with some members from Pine Hill went to Crossroads on December 31st and January 7th. We distributed your gifts to over 450 clients both days. Crossroads was initially established by Father McLaren, an Episcopal minister, to feed homeless men living on the street in Detroit. I think our gifts were a great addition to that vision.

We did not have many children come to Crossroads those days, and yet had many coats, hats, gloves and socks for them. Those clothing items were taken to the Oakland County Foster Closet and were eagerly accepted. Again, your donations have made a difference to many in need. Thank you!

Looking ahead, North Congregational Church will be working with the **Farmington Muslim Community Mosque on Sunday, May 5th** at Crossroads to prepare and serve a wonderful meal. You can start bringing in needed hygiene items and placing them in the supply room by the library at church. **Suggested items** are toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, deodorants, razors, shaving cream, shampoos and conditioners. Travel sized items are appreciated, but if you happen to have a BOGO offer for a full-sized hygiene product, that would be great too. Crossroads is now sponsoring a shower truck every other Monday at their facility, so the hygiene kits we assemble are used frequently.

If you happen to still have warm clothing (coats, hats, men's jeans, men's shoes), please feel free to bring those items into church, and place them in the Supply Room. Unfortunately, there are still some cold days ahead, and we can take your clean, gently used items to Crossroads, and hand them out as needed.

Boulley's debut novel *Firekeeper's Daughter* was the Great Michigan Read for this past year and a New York Times best seller. In *Warrior Girl Unearthed*, we return to Sugar Island and follow the story of Perry-Firekeeper Birch.

An excerpt from Goodreads:

...when she attends a meeting at a local university, Perry learns about the "Warrior Girl", an ancestor whose bones and knife are stored in the museum archives, and everything changes. Perry has to return Warrior Girl to her tribe.

Determined to help, she learns all she can about NAGPRA, the federal law that allows tribes to request the return of ancestral remains and sacred items. The university has been using legal loopholes to hold onto Warrior Girl and twelve other Anishinaabe ancestors' remains, and Perry and the Misfits won't let it go on any longer...
